Students mentoring are a method by which one can support students to improve their learning skills and developing overall aspects of the students. In view of this First sem and third sem students were divided into small groups having 7/8 students. Students were selected randomly. All method students were here in all groups. B.S.Latha, K.S.Siddaraju, G.Hemalatha, Yogeesh.A and Maruthi N N were the mentors in the college and Mentor mentee ratio was 1:8. Each group was headed by a teacher educator and mentoring class as per time table. Mentor and mentee used to meet once in 15 days. To begin with Teacher educator has to collect the details like Parents name, their occupation, their educational qualifications and phone number. Mentor maintained the record of students. Later each student is asked to introduce themselves to the other member of the group so that they will be more comfortable in the group. Further their opinion about B.Ed. and teaching profession is obtained. Students are motivated to come out with their problems and strength. They are made to express their problems in the classroom, with friends, in Library, washrooms, drinking water, sports facilities and alike. They are made to say these things by illustrating the teacher educator's experiences. Sometimes they can express their opinion over phone call also. Mentee details are not shared with other groups and teacher educators. Confidentiality is best maintained. Students were more comfortable with Lady mentors. Latha and Hematha were able to identify girl problems. They suggested an orientation programme on Their problems while preparing the seminar papers, presentations lesson plan writing, preparing learning materials are discussed. Some times in small group they are made to Share their feelings and problems strict confidentiality is maintained and not discussed with others. Their problem in preparing the seminar papers, presentation, lesson plan writing is discussed and motivated them by sharing their experiences also. Students developed a good relationship with the teacher educators. Their behavioural change was observable and developed confidence, overcome shyness and inferiority complex. In the beginning they hesitated to share later gradually they came out with their aspirations and goals. For some students their goals were not precise and clear. After mentoring they changed on their own. They were informed about how to apply for scholarships, hostel facilities available to them They took permission from the mentor before taking leave. When they fall sick the mentor guided them suitably for speedy recovery. They were educated about the, women empowerment, anti ragging cell and their role in guiding the juniors. Teacher educator guided for TET and CET exams also.

In view of this after teaching a unit set of Question it 2 mark answer, 5 mark question and 10 marks question were prepared by discussing with the students for which they are made to prepare notes of their own and get it corrected by the concerned teacher. After this they have to attend the test Answer paper were returned to them with suitable feedback like quality of answer, presentation style, length of the answer, Handwriting. If the performance was poor they are made to write it again and guide them properly to improve their performance, sometimes by the students also. students answer books were shuffled and giving then the outline of answer students are made to evaluate the paper write suggestions also, this was very joy full experience to them . After this two official test will be conducted .First test portion is 50 of the syllabus and second test portion is 50 . These test papers were presented before MAAC and the assessment is monitored by them and that assessment mark will be their internal marks . During micro teaching video recording is done so that one can think of self evaluation and self correction also. Students are cautiously monitored while writing the lesson plan, seminar paper and project work. Suitable feedback is given
